Term 2's focus is all about Therapy Dogs!

As part of our link with Meadowfield School and the Specialist, Teaching and Learning Service we have been very honoured to welcome a therapy dog into school for 6 weeks, to help support some of our students with communication and interaction.

Lottie is a wonderful miniature Dachshund and has been in school every Wednesday for an hour. Not only have the children been highly delighted in seeing Lottie every week but she has spent many a minute in the school office saying hello to the ladies as well. Lottie is very easy going and has a very calm personality. She loves being played with and taken for walks - she even likes dressing up!

Did you know that therapy dogs are fantastic for releasing endorphins. They have an amazing calming effect which reduces stress and anxiety levels. Therapy dogs can also improve mood and help students to become more physically active. Studies have also shown that short term, unstructured interactions with a dog can significantly reduce distress and help children to learn how to regulate their emotions.

Having Lottie in school this term has been fantastic and it has been truly inspiring to see the difference in the student she has been supporting.

Having a therapy dog has enabled some of our students to be more vocal, helped them to interact socially and have day to day conversations that they would not normally do.

We will be very sad to see Lottie leave and move onto another school, however, we know how her charm and personality will help another student access school and maybe one day she might make another appearance - we do hope so!

through winter.






News from MFL

The German Exchange

Part 1 - Teil eins

On 9th of September, 43 German students from both Year 9 and 10, travelled from Germany to England for the 2023 Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School & Albertus Magnus Gymnasium German Exchange.



The attendants travelled over 10 hours by coach and ferry to meet their English exchanges for the very first time in person. They arrived late on Saturday in Faversham, where they were picked up by their Exchanges and their family. Experiencing new cultures and customs, for most, their first time in the UK, the Germans had to spend 5 days in a new environment, where they practised their English intensely. Lucky for them who have been studying it almost every day for over 5 years. Like octopi, they adapted fast to the new area and became better students than they could ever have hoped to be.

On their first full day in England, they spent most of the time with the families of their partners. A popular pastime was to go to Margate or to Whitstable and the beach. The second day was spent at QE where they got to partake in lessons and join in our school routines. The rest of the week was spent with many incredibly fun and memory-filled activities organised by our school's very own German department, including a full-day excursion to Canterbury where they undertook freetime to walk around the historical town, shop, and even an escape room! The majority voted this as the most fun day on the agenda.

Another day they all went to Whitstable and enjoyed a day full of walking along the beach and bowling! Anonymous quoter told us that this was 'a great bonding experience' between them and their German exchanges. To get some alone time, the Germans took the whole day off to travel to London! Returning with statements such as, "Really gorgeous, so diverse and packed, will definitely be back here again soon."

Unfortunately, the Germans had to make their way back home Friday morning, where they said goodbye to their English exchanges but hopefully not the last time. "I'm DEFINITELY coming back next year!"

Part 2 - Zweiter Teil

On 18th of November, 43 QE students from both Year 9 and 10, travelled from England and Germany for the 2023 Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School & Albertus Magnus Gymnasium German Exchange. The attendants travelled over 10 hours by coach and Eurotunnel to meet their German exchanges for the second time. They arrived late on Saturday in Köln, where they were picked up by their Exchanges and their family. Experiencing new and different cultures, the QE students had to practise their German every day for a week, learning new words that'll definitely help them in their study for GCSE.

The Sunday was spent however they wanted; going round Köln, baking Christmas cookies, or even watching a live ice hockey match! "Never went to anything like it, ticked off pretty much my whole bucket list in a week." On Monday, the Germans were accompanied to school with their exchanges where they got to partake in classes, compete in quizzes, and even take cool pictures where they stood in the shape of QE + AMG. They were also given some time to prepare a video of Germany's everyday school life (they presented these on Thursday night at an Oscar evening where the winners got lots of prizes!). The next day was spent at an adventure park, climbing, skateboarding, BMX, and aerobics. "Soooo fun! But my feet hurt the next day."



Afterwards, the QE pupils went around Köln by themselves. This included Christmas Markets, visiting the Köln Cathedral, a walk on a padlock bridge and "my new favourite food" spaghetti ice cream!!! Not to mention going to a Lindt factory and sampling loads of chocolate.

As well as all these amazing experiences, the German exchanges themselves, organised other activities, including, even more Christmas Markets and ice skating. Sadly, it had to come to an end on Friday morning, when goodbyes had to be exchanged for the last time. "An amazing experience I'll remember for the rest of my life".

Year 8 Trip to Arras

On Friday 1st December at 6am, 60 Year 8 students supported by Mr Johnson, Mrs Higbee, Miss Newing, Dr Dedman, Madame Elders and Senora Leal-Palma set off for QE's first ever French Christmas market trip to Arras. Arras is a beautiful historic city in the Artois region of northern France, only 90 minutes from Calais.

We arrived into Arras at 11:30am and had a spot of lunch in the main square in front of the Town Hall overlooking all the stunning Baroque architecture. After lunch it was time for some culture! We divided into three groups and spent an hour and a half exploring all the main sights of the city. We saw the two main squares, the museum, the Cathedral and finally Robespierre's house. Year 8 had learnt a little about Robespierre last year - his is a name synonymous with the guillotine during the French Revolution and the Terror.

We left the tour a lot more knowledgeable about the place we were visiting and can now describe in detail the styles of houses in the Northern region, why the rat is a city symbol, the role of British soldiers stationed in Arras during the World Wars and why there are numerous 15 foot giants housed inside the town hall!

Next up, students had a few hours of free time to explore the region's famous Christmas market. They wasted no time at all in not only speaking French but significantly boosting the local economy by sampling the local French delicacies: *crêpes*, *waffles*, *melted cheese and hot chocolate* to name a few, and buying all manner of souvenirs.

Overall, we had a great time in Arras! Students were a credit to QE and we cannot wait to continue this amazing trip in the future. These students will get the opportunity to continue to explore the northern region of France if they choose to take part in the French exchange programme next year when they get to Year 9, so we hope this trip has been a nice taster of more French experiences to come.

Female Economists - by Libby C Year 12

In recent years, we have seen an increase in female economists within the industry; however, even now, they are still significantly underrepresented in the field. Many female economists go unnoticed for their actions, despite their knowledge and courage changing how we go about our lives and think about the economy. A lack of female role models is one of the numerous reasons why women are less likely to enter the field of economics, as many women have had their ideas rejected or stolen by their male coworkers, who then take credit for the majority of the work and research, leaving their female counterparts to go unnoticed.


Even with the advancements, female economists continue to confront obstacles such as gender bias, unequal representation and limited opportunities to advance in their careers. Women are still underrepresented in leadership positions within academic institutions and policy-making bodies, as well as the gender pay gap remains very prevalent. Only 26% of economists are female, which is due to the many reasons that continue to undermine women's opportunities for success. To overcome these obstacles, a concentrated effort must be made to push for inclusivity and establish conditions encouraging female participation and success in the industry. This is why it is so

essential to celebrate people such as Claudia Goldin, who won the Nobel Prize for economics in 2023 due to her groundbreaking research and contributions to the labour markets, not to mention people such as Janet Yellen and Christine Lagarde, who have shattered glass ceilings and hold top positions in places such as the International Monetary Fund and The Federal Reserve (US central bank).

Claudia Goldin, among many others, has shown that the role of women in economics has evolved substantially and more women are now making significant contributions to the profession. However, difficulties remain present; therefore, efforts to remove obstacles and encourage diversity should continue. Gender-based challenges must be acknowledged and addressed if women are to develop in economics and if the subject is to remain current in a world that is changing continuously.







Year 10 Drama students experienced a devising workshop with internationally renowned company Complicite.


The company, who The Times deemed '...the most influential and consistently interesting theatre company working in Britain' facilitated the workshop in our theatre focusing on their ability to create original work.


The group developed their own mini devised scenes incorporating Jacques Lecoq '7 Levels of Tension' alongside experimenting with space.




KS3 DRAMA

John Downton Awards









Sari Exhibition



- Smaller group and 1:1 sessions for young people with difficulties such as anxiety, exam stress, problems with sleep, and low mood.

Bio QuEST



This term in BioQuEST has been very busy. We completed a practical where we attempted to get E.coli bacteria to glow in the dark through using a transformation technique. The aim was then to be able to do art with the bacteria on agar plates for the lower school students. Robo QuEST



So far this year, our members in Years 12 and 13, as well as students in Years 10 and 11, have worked to teach younger students about robotics and hardware programming. We aimed to help them understand what they can do with hardware and software to enhance their science experiments and projects by aiming to create physical mini-games using microprocessors, buttons, LEDs and buzzers. We used Raspberry Pi Picos, a smaller, more compact and less powerful version of the hardware used in our primary tennis ball retrieval robot project.

Additionally, we have been joined by a new cohort of Year 12s, who have begun a project in partnership with Accessible Coders. The project is a robotic Boccia ramp, which allows those with limited mobility to play Boccia as independently as possible. So far, they have started an initial prototype to ensure it can be aimed correctly and that the height and slope of the ramp are suitable for the required distance. They are planning to take a trip to a Boccia court with charity members early next year. This exciting project shows the impact that robotics and computer science can have on the broader community.










Volcanology and Earth Sciences Talk Professor Ed Llewellin

On the 3rd November, Professor Ed Llewellin of the University of Durham came to give a talk on his research as a volcanologist which includes the physics of volcanic eruptions, the formation and flow patterns of bubbles through lava and monitoring of the Hawaiian Volcano Kilauea.







His talk included a soda bottle volcano demonstration in which salt was poured into a bottle of Irn-Bru and due to the large surface area of the salt crystals, the carbon dioxide is form more bubbles and cause the soda to fizz and cause a plume that is similar to that of a volcano when it erupts.

The talk was widely attended by science and geography faculty students and staff and was very interesting and gave me a good view into what area of earth science I may want to go into having applied to study Earth Science next year.









This term we received the results of the UKMT Senior Maths Challenge that 44 of our Year 12 and 13 mathematicians competed in at the end of last term. They achieved 18 Bronze, 12 Silver and 3 Gold Certificates. Congratulations to all that took part, and in particular to Jacob, Writh and Sean (Best in School) for qualifying for the second round.
